

We stopped at a very small castle looking structure, on Little Round Top and that is where we were going to eat our lunch. So we continued hiking, and we got to Devil's Den, where we hung out, jumping onto rocks and roaming around underneath of them. The view was just as nice before, only this time the trees were far away and replaced by fields, but there were also really nice looking monuments. 
